

Critical Thinking Rubric for Cosmetology Students

Use this rubric to assess critical thinking skills during cosmetology tasks such as hair styling, skin care, nail treatments, and salon management activities. Each 'P' type of thinking reflects a skill that helps students solve problems, make smart decisions, and work professionally.

Preventative	Plans ahead to avoid problems in styling or timing	Thinks about common issues and works carefully	Often reacts to problems instead of planning	Does not think ahead or prevent mistakes

Pioneering	Tries new styles, tools, or ideas with creativity and confidence	Open to trying new ideas with guidance	Needs encouragement to try new approaches	Avoids new techniques or change
